- Be in good health
- Pass the required Criminal Background checks

Academics:

In math, our students continue to work on Fact Families w/ missing addends. Also, we continue to practice addition and subtraction with and w/o regrouping.

In reading, our students continue to work on answering who, what, when, where, and why. Also, students will be learning about text features and the importance in text.

In science, our students will be learning about states of matter. Students will be able to recognize solids, liquids and gases they come in contact with daily. In the end, students will be able to explain and complete tasks showing how things can change from one state to another.

In writing, students will begin their informational writing. Students will focus on their choice of bird and write about its habitat, migration or adaptation pattern, diet, and other important facts about the bird.






ATHLETICS RAMS BASKETBALL Winter Banquet




Kindergarten students are programming our robot Dash using block coding, creativity, and collaboration!




In STEAM, all students (kindergarten through 8th grade) are working on coding/programming activities.

Kindergarten learners are practicing coding with Dash. This is the fourth robot that they have had the experience of coding this school year.


Spotlight on Specials!
